A 40 DAY EXPERIENCE

That we as individuals and as a church will grow by knowing and doing God's will and that others will be drawn to God's activity in our lives. It all begins on Sunday, September 25 when we focus on the truth, "God is always at work."

Missions Corner



Ponte Vedra United Methodist Church is a contributing participant in the work of Mission on the Move (MOM). MOM has followed Christ's command to "care for the least of these" by feeding, clothing and giving dental and medical care and refuge to deserted, abused or neglected children in Honduras and the Yucatan Peninsula of Mexico.

Over the past 15 years, MOM has donated six buses, two trucks, and one motor home type vehicle to other mission organizations in Latin America, as well as two buses to missions working among the Native American population of the United States. The vehicles are turned into mobile medical clinics before delivery. In this same period MOM has sent several hundred short-term mission team members to Central America including physicians and surgeons, nurses, physician assistants, pharmacists, well drillers, cooks, builders and teachers. This ministry

has managed to enjoy the support of local governments - a blessing rarely shared by other mission organizations.

MOM has also shipped many thousands of tons of beans, rice, clothing and medicine to feed the hungry of Honduras and Mexico. They have a scholarship program for students in country and have helped several study in the U.S., preparing to return home to serve.

This is an incredibly effective outreach led primarily by United Methodist volunteers with practically no administrative overhead. Thank you for supporting Mission on the Move through a portion of your regular giving.

Hurricane Relief

Three weeks ago Cuba was battered by 150 mph winds brought on by Hurricane Dennis. The storm caused an estimated 38 deaths in Cuba and Haiti and destroyed homes and crops, according to a release from the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR).

Another casualty of the storm was Cuba's Methodist churches. The southeastern part of the island received the brunt of the storm, and Cuba Methodist Bishop Ricardo Pereira's office reported eight Methodist churches in that area were destroyed.

In response UMCOR has established a new Advance called Repairs of Cuban Churches and Structures. Individuals who would like to help rebuild churches and parsonages that were damaged or destroyed may designate their gifts "**Cuban Church Repairs.**"

Individuals who would like to help with general recovery efforts in Cuba and Haiti may designate their gifts "**Hurricanes 2005 Global.**" These funds will not be used to rebuild church structures.

Let's be in prayer for all who have suffered loss in the early storms of this hurricane season.

Youth Ministry News & Events

It is remarkable how a few short days can have such a tremendous impact on our lives. I and four of our high school students traveled to Atlanta, July 10-15 to participate in the DOOR program. DOOR stands for Discovering Opportunities for Outreach and Reflection, and they have a threefold purpose for these week-long trips. The first goal is to match us up with agencies in need of volunteers and the second goal is to help us discover ways we can be working toward alleviating homelessness and poverty in our own local communities. The third, and arguably most important, goal for DOOR is helping participants find the face of God in the city. There were ample opportunities for each of us to experience God's work throughout the week.

Our group served a different agency each day. Our first day was spent at the Central Presbyterian Outreach Center sitting in with caseworkers and serving light snacks and beverages to those who were waiting in line to see a caseworker. Our second day was spent serving very nice made-from-scratch gourmet style lunches to a select group of people experiencing homelessness who had signed pledges to actively improve their situations in life. On day three we found ourselves working in two locations. The first location was a product recovery center where we sorted usable grocery items and repackaged them for resale (at a mere 16¢ per pound!) to the local assistance agencies. The second location was a meal-packaging facility where we put together frozen meals to be delivered by Meals on Wheels. On our fourth and final day, we delivered the meals we'd packaged the previous day.

When we were not volunteering, we had time to discuss our response to these issues in our own communities. Each of our students said they felt more could be done locally and that their previous experiences with homelessness were virtually nonexistent, occurring at a distance or through a closed car window. We came away from the DOOR program with a deeper and better understanding of these issues and a desire to become involved with local solutions.

Each of us wants to do what we can do, and that includes informing others of the things we have seen and done this summer. Ben Hancock, Tucker Holland, Sam Lucas, Austin Patneau and I are more than happy to share our experiences with any who are interested, just ask us any time you see us. We also invite those who are interested in easing the burden of those less fortunate than ourselves to join us in exploring ideas to serve our local areas. We may not solve these problems on our own, but we are eager and excited to be working toward the solution.

Go Deep

This fall we're offering three opportunities for in-depth study of the Bible and the faith we share. Each requires 30 minutes daily for reading and reflection and 2½ hours for a weekly group meeting. It's a substantial investment but if you make it you'll find yourself reaping incredible dividends. DISCIPLE I - Becoming Disciples Through Bible Study

Prerequisite: None.

Meets Wednesday evenings at 7pm beginning September 7.

Leader: Diane Lee

This is a general survey of the entire Bible. You will read approximately 70% of the Bible during the 34 weeks. Lesson 33 is a special time of positive affirmation and discernment where each participant will have opportunity to talk about their personal goals for discipleship. The purpose of the study is to develop biblically nourished persons committed to live as disciples.

Each meeting begins with prayer and a short introduction to the topic for the lesson. A video is viewed featuring an expert in the specific subject matter. A discussion period seeks to bring alive the daily readings. Following a break a second discussion time focuses on the discipleship aspect of the lesson. Prayer requests are shared and the session is closed with a prayer.

DISCIPLE IV - Under The Tree Of Life

Prerequisite: DISCIPLE I

Meets Wednesday evenings at 7pm beginning September 7.

Leader: Jerry Sanders

The word "under" in the title is meant to convey a welcoming invitation to shelter, security, and rest in God's love. Come rest in the words of John, The Writings, and Revelation while studying the mystery and wonder these books have to offer in this 32-week course.

Participants in *Under the Tree of Life* will recognize the familiar rhythm and requirements of daily Scripture reading and note taking in preparation for discussion in the weekly group meeting. The study manual guides daily study of the biblical text and calls for written responses that become grist for discussion in the weekly group meeting.

Two new elements in the study manual format represent special emphases in this study — the psalm of the week and the radical disciple. The psalm of the week will lead people into a deeper life of prayer using psalms as a guide. The study offers suggestions on experiencing the psalm of the week. The radical disciple focuses on thoughts or actions relevant to the weekly theme.

Whether praying or taking steps toward radical discipleship, participants know they are not alone—the community is there.

CHRISTIAN BELIEVER - Knowing God with Heart and Mind

Prerequisite: None.

Meets Sunday evenings at 7pm beginning September 11.

Leader: Gary Proctor

Christian Believer is a 30-week study of the classical doctrines of the Christian faith. These doctrines include God's Providence, Atonement, Judgment, Eternal Life and many more. Structured like the Disciple Bible program, Christian Believer participants daily read both Scripture and writings of early and modern church leaders and theologians. Once a week, individuals meet together to watch a video and discuss what they have learned. Take Christian Believer to understand more fully what the Church has believed and taught over the centuries and to learn the concepts and images that unite us all as Christian believers.

A Note From Pastor Jeff.

Jill recently read an article in a parenting magazine that said that once you start having kids you no longer go on vacations, you go on *trips*. Jill and I both say amen to that, having recently returned from a *trip* visiting family that was a lot of work. (It has a lot to do with a certain 3½ year old and a pair of 8 month olds.)

Our trip was not without several blessings, I'm glad to say. My favorite blessing was when one of my sisters and her husband confided that age 0 - 1 year is their least favorite age to parent. (Laura and Dave's kids are 9, 6 and 4.) I so appreciated that sharing! They are great parents so... Maybe it's okay just to hang in there and do the work, even though I don't particularly enjoy this season. Maybe it's okay that while I love my children, I don't always *like* them.

That kind of sharing comes in the context of community. I'm blessed to be part of a community (the family into which I was born) that can share this sort of thing. Community sure beats doing life alone.

I've been doing a lot of thinking about how we as the church can be community with each other, and a community that embraces outsiders. Many of our small groups experience community. Our Sunday morning worship feels like community to me. What are some other means by which we can experience and offer community?
